The Arc of Wichita County

Burkburnett Boys & Girls Club The BBGC had 3 girls participate in the Girls With Impact Program which is an online mini-MBA program for girls 14-18. This program prepares them to form a business idea, make a business plan, prepare a prototype, and a venture pitch. This course is a 10 week. 1 hour live class and they collaborate with other girls their age around Texas to encourage each other and grow their ideas. After they graduate, they are matched with a mentor and a global alumni network, which will have a future impact on college and career success. Child Advocates (CASA)

Patti was a special education counselor for Montague County while Tara attended elementary school there. Because Tara was in foster care, Patti took a special interest in her. By the time Tara was 15 she had been placed in a Residential Treatment Center near Houston, but a court date



in Montague was coming up. Tara needed a Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA), and Patti was recruited as the perfect person to represent her! Six years later, although Tara has "aged out" of the foster care system, Patti stays in touch

with Tara and remains a significant part of her life. Despite having lived in 27 different

placements, Tara is making her way in the world as a young adult. CASA volunteers always have a great impact on the lives of the children they serve, but they do not typically know the children first. Patti was specifically chosen to be Tara's CASA, and their relationship is an example of a success story that not only thrives but also endures.

Children's Home and Teen Shelter

Hannah and her little sister's mom left their dad due to abuse, unfortunately she left the girls with

him and disappeared. Hannah never felt she and her little sister were safe with their dad, but no one listened. After talking to a school counselor, the girls came to live at the children's home. They finally felt secure. It took several months, and a foster home was located so both girls could stay together. The search for their mom continued and after several years she was located and was willing to work on doing what was necessary to return the girls to her care. This involved mom having a stable job, a suitable place to live and raise two girls as well as many personal hurdles. She did the work and the girls have been returned to their mom.
